1. Call to Order, Officer Elections, Approval of Minutes and Agenda

<u>Call to Order</u> – David T called the meeting to order at 9:36 and welcomed attendees. <u>Approval of Minutes</u> – The minutes were approved as presented. <u>Approval of Agenda</u> – The agenda was adjusted and the presentation orders were reversed.

2. Introductions, Elections, Reports

Introductions

Ron Averill welcomed the group to Lewis County and the former Mineral School third grade room. He noted value of Council work, and highlighted that Lewis County is pleased to participate and represent the small Lewis County portion of the watershed.

<u>Officer Elections</u> – The Nominating Committee proposed the nomination of Ron Averill as Vice Chair and David Troutt as Chair of the Nisqually River Council for 2010.

The motion was approved and seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to approve Ron and David T as officers of the NRC.

Advisory Committee Reports –

- Citizens Advisory Committee David H and Sara reported that the CAC has been focused on developing recommendations for the NWSP update. 2010 Officers are David Hymel, Chair and Bob Smith, Vice-chair. Paul Crosetto, Fred Michelson, and Bob Smith are the 2010 NRC Representatives.
- Environmental Advisory Committee This committee has met five times and spent the year educating members about the watershed. The Committee has developed some recommendations for the NWSP update.
- Economic Advisory Committee Economic advisory has not met, no report.
- Community Advisory Committee Steve Pruitt reported that this committee began meeting last March; planning process developed last summer, in fall a few key

elements to focus on were identified, in November goals were identified. They come to the retreat with two proposals:

- 1. That in 2010 the Community Advisory Committee "Task Force" develop and deliver a suite of services to communities throughout the Watershed to assist them in:
 - A) Identifying existing groups and leaders to spearhead the creation of community forums based on inclusion and collaboration
 - B) Accessing the resources of the Nisqually River Council to address community goals and issues identified in the Nisqually Watershed Stewardship Plan
 - C) Providing formal representation from each forum to a Community Advisory Committee to be formed and approved by the Nisqually River Council at its annual retreat in 2011.

Potential Forum Areas Include:

- Nisqually Reservation
- Yelm
- Roy

- Graham
- Lackamas
- Eatonville School

Forum groups will be self-contained and not directly supported by Council staff.

2. Proposed language expanding the vision statement for the "Involved Community" element (see 2010 Nisqually Watershed Stewardship Plan Comments and Discussion).

Survey - Sara referenced a survey she provided relating to Council communication preferences and requested that attendees fill out and return the surveys or provide feedback directly.

3. Overview of Plan

Justin Hall provided an overview of the Nisqually River Council history and the Nisqually Watershed Stewardship Plan development, realization, and next steps.

Much has been accomplished to date: removal of dikes/estuary restoration, 74% of the watershed in "permanent protection", major <u>restoration work</u> in Eatonville along the Mashel River. There has been amazing progress in the last five years.

It was noted that the Stewardship Plan played a primary role in the development of the Nisqually State Park.

We must now identify direct goals and measurable, specific tasks which can progress along with the development of the 3 year work plans.

4. Lunch / Salmon Recovery Plan Update

Jeanette provided an overview of the Tribe's Salmon Recovery work. Early action restoration projects include the estuary, Mashel River, and Ohop Creek, as well as acquisition by the Land Trust of 2.1 miles of river frontage: the Tatrimima property and the Manke property. The Blake property, by the Centralia powerhouse was also secured; Thurston County Conservation Futures provided the match

2010 Salmon Recovery Highlights

- 3 year workplan due to Puget Sound Partnership by May 15th; will bring to the April NRC meeting for review
- Salmon Recovery funding round this year: tentatively \$416,000 for Nisqually in 2010 (not official until May meeting; ~\$18 million for the state)
- Request from Nisqually Land Trust
- Request to transfer knotweed project to Conservation District

Joe Kane spoke about the proposed whitewater reach acquisitions and the Ceja property. The property is in foreclosure, and there will be a courthouse auction on April 9. The Land Trust wants to move quickly; buy the entire property and do a boundary line adjustment creating a five acre parcel along the road with the house, and keep the remainder of the property in protection. He asked the Council to set aside \$150,000 of the available funds for this acquisition. The Land Trust may also have the opportunity to pick up 15 acres of the neighboring property, which is owned by the same people. Jeanette noted that the Salmon Habitat Workgroup discussed the issue and recommends to the Council that they fund this proposal. It was moved, seconded, and approved to allocate \$150,000 of the 2010 Nisqually Salmon Recovery funds to the Nisqually Land Trust for acquisition of the Ceja property.

5. Knotweed Project

Jeanette reported that the knotweed project has been identified to be outside the scope of the Pierce County Noxious Weed Board. Pierce Conservation District is willing to host and manage the project. The staff person will be transitioned along with the project. Jeanette asked for feedback, then indicated she would write a letter to the agency indicating that the NRC supports the transfer of the project and grant to the Pierce Conservation District.

6. Discussion of Nisqually Stewardship Plan and New Council Model and Roles

A small group will work with the NRC Chair to develop an update to the plan. This draft update, which will include identification of measurable goals and incorporate suggested changes where feasible, will be brought to the Council in May. Actions items will be removed from the plan and incorporated into 3 year work plans. Once the draft plan is approved by the Council, teams consisting of Council Member, CAC members, staff, and resource professionals will develop 3 year works plans focused on the implementation of plan elements. These teams will work to outline and define actions which support the visions, goals, and objectives of the various elements of the plan.

Goals moving forward:

- Widen the tent, capture more projects under the Council umbrella;
- Identify likely sponsors and affiliates (organizations/agencies/individuals best suited to take the components forward)

3 Year Work Plan Process Overview

- 1. Identify specific goals & objectives
- 2. Provide Priority Area focus. What are the specific goals and objectives for the areas that need to be improved?
- 3. Identify necessary actions. Work with partners. Ask "what can you do to help with this process"? And "what can we do to help you accomplish your goals"?

The format of the 3 year work plan base document was created by the <u>Puget Sound Partnership</u> for all watersheds in Puget Sound.

David T noted that this process need not be aggressive, and it may be better to have 10 things we are pursuing, rather than 100 things we are not addressing. Steve suggested the Council's executive committee work to pull in member organizations that have been active in the past but are not active now.

7. For the Good of the Order

- Bryan Bowden noted that Mount Rainier National Park has been reluctant to lead the CMZ planning process because it's a multijurisdictional process and the Park isn't interested in leading or planning for other jurisdictions. The Park would be willing to hire an independent contractor to facilitate the process, but would be involved as a stakeholder and not a driver.
- Mary Foster provided a copy of a request sent to Congressman Dicks and Senator Cantwell asking for "a study that examine(s) the potential for, and types of management, for restoring the Upper Nisqually."
